WHEREAS, Dr. Evangeline Bowie used land management techniques including planting over 500,000 trees that transformed barren and eroded land into a park treasure gifted to the city that now includes over 700 acres of forest, lakes and 17 miles of trails; and

WHEREAS, the City of Fairview is located on the Western Highland Rim, and within a diverse and unique hardwood forest; and

WHEREAS, the Redbud Tree has been designated the Official City Tree; and

WHEREAS, the City of Fairview was designated as a Tree City USA in 2019; and

WHEREAS, Trees

WHEREAS, trees, wherever they are planted, are a source of joy and spiritual renewal; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Commissioners of Fairview, Tennessee does hereby proclaim April 30, 2021 as Arbor Day in the City of Fairview, to be observed annually on the last Friday in April going forward, and urges the citizens to plant trees and protect our woodlands to promote the wellbeing of this and future generations.

ORDINANCE NO. 2021-11



AN ORDINANCE TO AMEND CITY OF FAIRVIEW, TENNESSEE, MUNICIPAL CODE, TITLE 7, CHAPTER 5, SECTION 7-503(b) AND TO CREATE SECTION 7-503(c).

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners of the City of Fairview, Tennessee, has determined that the Municipal Code of the City of Fairview, Tennessee, should be revised by amending Title 7, Chapter 5, Section 7-503(a) and Section 7-503(b) and by creating Title 7, Chapter 5, Section 7-503(c), and

WHEREAS, Section 7-503(a) entitled Permits Required currently reads as follows: "It shall be unlawful for any person, other than a person acting exclusively on behalf of a registered non-profit organization to sell, store, offer for sale, ship or cause to be shipped into the City of Fairview except as herein provided any item of fireworks, without first having secured the required applicable permit as a distributor, wholesale or retailer, from both the City of Fairview Fire Chief and his/her assigns, and the State Fire Marshall (as required by Tennessee Code Annotated, § 68-104-101, et seq.), possession of said permits being hereby made a condition pre-requisite to selling, storing, or offering for sale, shipping or causing to be shipped, any fireworks into the City of Fairview except as herein provided. Permits issued under this section are not transferrable; and

WHEREAS, Section 7-503(b) entitled Tax Exempt Status currently reads as follows: "Proof of valid Internal Revenue Service 501-C(3) tax exempt status shall be required for any person and/or entity proposing to sell fireworks. The City of Fairview shall issue no permit for the sale of fireworks unless the applicant has first provided documentation that it is a registered non-profit organization.", and

WHEREAS, Section 7-503(c) has not yet been created, and

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FAIRVIEW, TENNESSEE AS FOLLOWS:

The Fairview, Tennessee, Municipal Code, Title 7, Chapter 5, Section 7-503(a) is hereby amended to read as follows:

"It shall be unlawful for any person, other than a person who is a member of a registered non-profit organization, identified in Section 7-503(b) below, to sell, store, offer for sale, ship or cause to be shipped into the City of Fairview except as herein provided any item of fireworks, without first having secured the required applicable permit as a distributor, wholesale or retailer, from both the City of

Fairview Fire Chief and his/her assigns, and the State Fire Marshall (as required by Tennessee Code Annotated, § 68-104-101, et seq.), possession of said permits being hereby made a condition pre-requisite to selling, storing, or offering for sale, shipping or causing to be shipped, any fireworks into the City of Fairview except as herein provided. It shall further be unlawful for any person issued said permit to allow any individual who is not also a member of the same registered non-profit organization to work in a firework tent, building, or other structure. Permits issued under this section are not transferrable to third-parties.” , and

The Fairview, Tennessee, Municipal Code, Title 7, Chapter 5, Section 7-503(b) is hereby amended to read as follows:

“Proof of valid Internal Revenue Service 501-C(3) tax exempt status shall be required for any person and/or entity proposing to sell fireworks. The City of Fairview shall issue no permit for the sale of fireworks unless the applicant has first provided documentation that it is a registered non-profit organization with a certificate of incorporation and active federal employer identification number, can attest to a having a physical business address within the City of Fairview, and has further provided documentation of proof of providing non-profit community services to City of Fairview citizens. Said non-profit organization must be listed as the owner on the State of Tennessee seasonal retail fireworks license.” , and

BE IT FURTHER ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FAIRVIEW, TENNESSEE, AS FOLLOWS:

The Fairview, Tennessee, Municipal Code, Title 7, Chapter 5, Section 7-503(c) is hereby created and shall read as follows:

7-503(c). Proof of Insurance. Proof of insurance sufficient to properly insure liability coverage for the 501-C(3) during the transport, storage, sale and disposal of fireworks intended to be transported into, stored in, sold in or otherwise disposed of within the corporate limits of the City of Fairview must be provided to the city at the time of permit application and said insurance is required to be in effect for the duration of any issued fireworks sales permit.

WHEREAS, the city of Fairview Zoning Ordinance, and the zoning maps therein adopted be, and the same are hereby amended by rezoning the property herein described as .89 acres of property located at 7001 City Center Way, Williamson County Tax Map 042, Parcel 168.10, from MSMU, Main Street Mixed Use, to CG, Commercial General, as requested by representative Brian Peterson; and

WHEREAS, said parcel of property to be rezoned from MSMU to CG is located within the corporate limits of the City of Fairview; and

WHEREAS, the City of Fairview Municipal Planning Commission approved the request and forwarded to the Board of Commissioners on January 12, 2021, with a recommendation for approval without conditions; and

WHEREAS, that all Ordinances or parts of Ordinances in conflict with are hereby repealed.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF FAIRVIEW, TENNESSEE, BOARD OF COMMISSIONERS, to amend the zoning ordinance of the city of Fairview, by rezoning .89 acres of property, located at 7001 City Center Way, Williamson County Tax Map 042, Parcel 168.10, from MSMU, Main Street Mixed Use, to CG, Commercial General, the public welfare requiring it. The rezoning of this site shall be subject to all City ordinances and regulations.

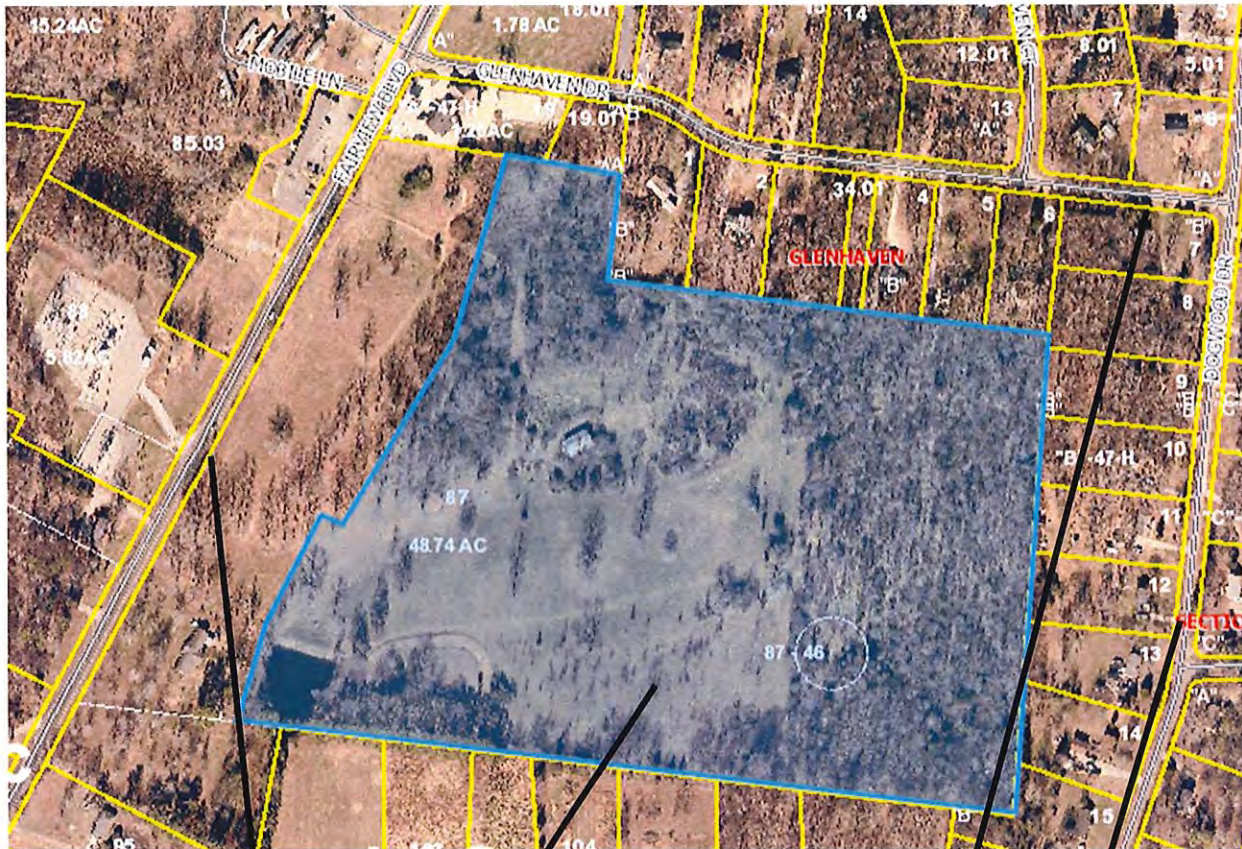

ORDINANCE No. 2021-12

AN ORDINANCE OF THE CITY OF FAIRVIEW, TENNESSEE, ADOPTING AN ANNUAL BUDGET AND TAX RATE FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2021 AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2022

WHEREAS, Tennessee Code Annotated § 9-1-116 requires that all funds of the State of Tennessee and all its political subdivisions shall first be appropriated before being expended and that only funds that are available shall be appropriated; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Budget Law of 1982 requires that the governing body of each municipality adopt and operate under an annual budget ordinance presenting a financial plan with at least the information required by that state statute, that no municipality may expend any moneys regardless of the source except in accordance with a budget ordinance and that the governing body shall not make any appropriation in excess of estimated available funds; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Commissioners has published the annual operating budget and budgetary comparisons of the proposed budget with the prior year (actual) and the current year (estimated) in a newspaper of general circulation not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting where the Board will consider final passage of the budget.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF MAYOR AND ALDERMEN OF THE CITY OF FAIRVIEW, TENNESSEE, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: That the governing body projects anticipated revenues from all sources and appropriates planned expenditures for each department, board, office or other agency of the municipality, herein presented together with the actual annual receipts and expenditures of the last preceding fiscal year and the estimated annual expenditures for the current fiscal year, and from those revenues and unexpended and unencumbered funds as follows for fiscal year 2022, and including the projected ending balances for the budget year, the actual ending balances for the most recent ended fiscal year and the estimated ending balances for the current fiscal years:

SECTION 2: At the end of the fiscal year 2022, the governing body estimates fund balances or deficits as follows:

State Street Aid	\$77,700
Drug Enforcement Fund	\$38,550
General Fund	\$4,313,954

SECTION 3: That the governing body herein certifies that the condition of its sinking funds, if applicable, are compliant pursuant to its bond covenants, and recognizes that the municipality has outstanding bonded and other indebtedness as follows:

General Fund	\$2,100,000
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SECTION 4: During the coming fiscal year (2022) the governing body has pending and planned capital projects with proposed funding as follows:

Multiple stormwater management projects funded by grant and general fund sources; Multiple Road improvement projects funded by grant and general fund sources; American’s with Disabilities Act (ADA) accessibility improvements funded by grant and general fund sources; Roadway improvements funded through state and general fund sources; Technology improvements funded through grant and general fund sources.

SECTION 5: No appropriation listed above may be exceeded without an amendment of the budget ordinance as required by the Municipal Budget Law of 1982 (TCA § 6-56-208). In addition, no appropriation may be made in excess of available funds except to provide for an actual emergency threatening the health, property or lives of the inhabitants of the municipality and declared by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of at least a quorum of the governing body in accord with Tennessee Code Annotated § 6-56-205.

SECTION 6: Money may be transferred from one appropriation to another in the same fund in an amount of up to \$10,000 by the City Manager, subject to such limitations and procedures as set by the Board of Mayor and Aldermen pursuant to Tennessee Code

Annotated § 6-56-209. Any resulting transfers shall be reported to the governing body at its next regular meeting and entered into the minutes.

SECTION 7: A detailed financial plan will be attached to this budget and become part of this budget ordinance. In addition, the published operating budget and budgetary comparisons shown by fund with beginning and ending fund balances and the number of full-time equivalent employees required by Tennessee Code Annotated § 6-56-206 will be attached.

SECTION 8: There is hereby levied a property tax of \$0.8765 per \$100 of assessed value on all real and personal property.

SECTION 9: This annual operating and capital budget ordinance and supporting documents shall be submitted to the Comptroller of the Treasury or Comptroller's Designee for approval if the City has debt issued pursuant to Title 9, Chapter 21 of the Tennessee Code Annotated within fifteen (15) days of its adoption. This budget shall not become the official budget for the fiscal year until such budget is approved by the Comptroller of the Treasury or Comptroller's Designee in accordance with Title 9, Chapter 21 of the Tennessee Code Annotated (the "Statutes".) If the Comptroller of the Treasury or Comptroller's Designee determines that the budget does not comply with the Statutes, the Governing Body shall adjust its estimates or make additional tax levies sufficient to comply with the Statutes or as directed by the Comptroller of the Treasury or Comptroller's Designee. If the City does not have such debt outstanding, it will file this annual operating and capital budget ordinance and supporting documents with the Comptroller of the Treasury or Comptroller's Designee.

SECTION 10: All unencumbered balances of appropriations remaining at the end of the fiscal year shall lapse and revert to the respective fund balances.

SECTION 11: All ordinances or parts of ordinances in conflict with any provision of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

SECTION 12: This ordinance shall take effect July 1, 2021, the public welfare requiring it.
